This year the total on site was 107, of whom 30 were in the age range 8 to 15 years old, for whom Camp is intended. We had 12 children under Camp age (Campers of the future!) with their parents, and 13 in the 16 to 17 age range, who are expected to start taking more of a leadership role as they approach adulthood. A number of the 8 to 15 year olds came as a result of our challenge to last year's Campers to bring a friend for £50 as first timers. Many of these have already expressed the wish to come back next year, which bodes well for the future. We continue to attract children who have no church connection other than Camp, as well as those from churches, both URC and others.

We are committed to a re-connection with our roots in the URC, and have met several times with Cathy Glazier, the new Southern Synod CYDO. Our leader also attends the Synod Children's and Youth work Committee. We are working towards bringing in a constitution for Camp in the near future, and have been greatly supported in this by Lisa-Maria Browning, from the East Kent Synod Area Pastoral Committee. We have also received a huge amount of friendship, support, encouragement and advocacy on our behalf from Rev David Bedford, the EKSA leader. We give him our heartfelt thanks for this, and pray for him and Lorna to receive God's blessing as they shortly move to pastures new, still within Southern Synod, in Surrey.
